On Saturday, June 18, I led a group of 12 people to the Ruby Hill Winery for tour of the winery, wine tastings, and food pairings. Margaret and I have been members of the Ruby Hill Wine Club for several years as they produce some favorite wines; specifically, their Pinot Noir, Barbera, and Sangiovese.

The tour started out in the tasting room with a tasting of their Sparking Brut which everyone seemed to enjoy. Sparkling wines are not usually my thing but they must have been pretty good based on how many were purchased later. Next, we adjourned to the "bus" which really gets your attention. It is old school bus that has been painted like what I used to call a "Hippy Mobil". It turns that the owners of the Ruby Hill Winery are the founders of TOGO's Sandwich Shops and were serious fans of the Grateful Dead Rock Band several years ago. This bus is one of the buses that the Grateful Dead used to tour the county when they were doing concerts. When the Grateful Dead no longer needed the bus, Ruby Hill purchased it and made it their tour bus. interior seats were removed and replaced with 14 wine barrels that are modified as chairs that rotate. I did know that the owners were Grateful Dead fans and to honor them, they named one of their wines "Grapeful Red". However, I did not know the bus was theirs and now appropriately represents that past era.

### **Abstract of Minutes of Branch Executive Committee (BEC)**

Our guide, Klay (and bus driver), took us out into the vineyard and explained some of the details of grape growing and winemaking. They have instituted some new techniques that allow them to grow the grapes with about half the water as was previously used. We then sampled a wine that came from these vines. Next, we were taken into the production area and sampled two wines from barrels because they had not completed their ageing. You could tell as the wines were not quite as smooth as the fully aged wines. That is when he explained that they use 3 kinds of Oak for the barrels. French is approximately \$1800 per barrel and American is \$1000 per barrel. Most people can tell the difference but which is better is a matter of taste. Later Klay indicated that most of that cost difference is in transportation costs. If you want to buy a depleted wine barrel, they cost \$50.

We finished up with the newest of the Rudy Hill Wines, a sweet dessert wine. They have just started offering a port dessert wine that was paired with chocolate. Both were superb. This was especially appropriate as Roy, Margaret and I are trying to schedule a trip to Portugal (Lisbon and Porto) and the Douro Valley (cruising on the Douro River) in the next year or so. This is the region where Port Wine was first produced and is still what the region is known for. This trip has been on my bucket list for quite a while and I am really looking forward to removing it from that list ASAP.

This is not my first time to do this tour and I enjoy it (and learn) each time. If anyone would enjoy doing this tour, I would be very happy to do it again. It takes a minimum of 8 people and the bus maximum is 14 people at a cost of \$45 per person. Usually, a couple of weeks' notice is all that is needed to schedule a tour.
